

Batchley First School and Nursery Privacy Notice.

The categories of pupil information that we process include:

- personal identifiers and contacts (such as name, unique pupil number, contact details and address), including information about parents / carers.
- characteristics (such as ethnicity, language, and free school meal eligibility) (safeguarding information (such as court orders and professional involvement) •
- special educational needs (including the needs and ranking)
- medical and administration (such as doctors information, child health, dental health, allergies, medication and dietary requirements)
- attendance (such as sessions attended, number of absences, absence reasons and any previous schools attended)
- assessment and attainment (both regular ongoing assessments by adults in school and more formal assessment such as key stage 1 and phonics results)
- behavioural information (such as exclusions and any relevant alternative provision put in place)

This list is not exhaustive, the current list of categories of information we process is being finalised and reviewed and will be on the school website from September 2018. In the meantime for more information, please see the Headteacher.

Why we collect and use pupil information

We collect and use pupil information, for the following purposes:

- a) to support pupil learning
- b) to monitor and report on pupil attainment progress
- c) to provide appropriate pastoral care
- d) to assess the quality of our services
- e) to keep children safe (food allergies, or emergency contact details)
- f) to meet the statutory duties placed upon us for DfE data collections

Under the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR), the lawful bases we rely on for processing pupil information are:

- for the purposes of it being a public tasks – that is needed in the running of a school's general procedures and processes, in accordance with the legal basis of individuals giving the school explicit consent to do so for themselves or for .
- Pupil attainment data is collected under a legal obligation at points during a child's school career,

In addition, concerning any special category data:

- conditions - racial or ethnic origin of GDPR - Article 9_where we have a legal obligation to process this information for DfE data returns.

How we collect pupil information

We collect pupil information via forms sent out when a child starts with the school and at the start of each year. We might also request information about

Pupil data is essential for the schools' operational use. Whilst the majority of pupil information you provide to us is mandatory, some of it requested on a voluntary basis. In order to comply with the data protection legislation, we will inform you at the point of collection, whether you are required to provide certain pupil information to us or if you have a choice in this.

How we store pupil data

We hold pupil data securely for the set amount of time shown in our data retention schedule. ThFor more information on our data retention schedule and how we keep your data safe, please visit our website from September 2018.

Who we share pupil information with

We routinely share pupil information with:

- schools that the pupils attend after leaving us
- our local authority
- the Department for Education (DfE)
- Local health services – for example the school nurse.
- External education providers
- Our catering provider

Why we regularly share pupil information

We do not share information about our pupils with anyone without consent unless the law and our policies allow us to do so.

Most information we share is due to a statutory reason to do so. For example, the local authority has to collect data about children at three points in the year for the census.

We also share data externally where there is need to so for operational need – for example, sharing dietary needs with our catering services provider so they can ensure that those needs are met, or contact details when an external provider (eg sports coach or our residential activity provider) might be taking responsibility for a child.

We might share information in paper format, or electronically if that can be secure.

Statutory data returns are transferred over a secure DfE internet protocol which is encrypted and password protected.

Department for Education

The Department for Education (DfE) collects personal data from educational settings and local authorities via various statutory data collections. We are required to share information about our pupils with the Department for Education (DfE) either directly or via our local authority for the purpose of those data collections, under:

Section 3 of The Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013.

All data is transferred securely and held by DfE under a combination of software and hardware controls, which meet the current [government security policy framework](#).

Requesting access to your personal data

Under data protection legislation, parents and pupils have the right to request access to information about them that we hold. To make a request for your personal information, or be given access to your child's educational record, contact **the school office initially**.

You also have the right to:

- object to processing of personal data that is likely to cause, or is causing, damage or distress
- prevent processing for the purpose of direct marketing
- object to decisions being taken by automated means
- in certain circumstances, have inaccurate personal data rectified, blocked, erased or destroyed; and
- a right to seek redress, either through the ICO, or through the courts

How Government uses your data

The pupil data that we lawfully share with the DfE through data collections:

- underpins school funding, which is calculated based upon the numbers of children and their characteristics in each school.
- informs 'short term' education policy monitoring and school accountability and intervention (for example, school GCSE results or Pupil Progress measures).
- supports 'longer term' research and monitoring of educational policy (for example how certain subject choices go on to affect education or earnings beyond school)

The National Pupil Database (NPD)

Much of the data about pupils in England goes on to be held in the National Pupil Database (NPD).

The NPD is owned and managed by the Department for Education and contains information about pupils in schools in England. It provides invaluable evidence on educational performance to inform independent research, as well as studies commissioned by the Department.

It is held in electronic format for statistical purposes. This information is securely collected from a range of sources including schools, local authorities and awarding bodies.

Sharing by the Department

The law allows the Department to share pupils' personal data with certain third parties, including:

- schools
- local authorities
- researchers
- organisations connected with promoting the education or wellbeing of children in England

- other government departments and agencies
- organisations fighting or identifying crime

Organisations fighting or identifying crime may use their legal powers to contact DfE to request access to individual level information relevant to detecting that crime. Whilst numbers fluctuate slightly over time, DfE typically supplies data on around 600 pupils per year to the Home Office and roughly 1 per year to the Police.
